



The U.K. sales team is now led by Lesley Lawton - who joins us from Lledo, plus approximately 10 new employees at the Neath factory joining Taff, also Andy in Atlanta has 2 new key persons joining him. So overall O.D.C.'s growth in 1999 has been substantial along with us now being the leading U.K. die-cast manufacturer. You'll note the new Model A vehicle is available - and a model I would strongly recommend. The new year sees us set to produce at least one more new mould, with a progressive line of new body releases scheduled to follow.

If any of you still want to register with the girls at Tring, Fiona, Mags or Mel for a factory visit, there's still time! I'll be in the U.S. from mid January onward but that man's going to be there, along with Taff and his crew. It will probably be a bit chaotic with the new machines being installed, but still worth while. If you've already been to the factory, you're welcome to come again.

Cutty Sark - Her History

"She was the fastest ship of her day, a grand ship, and a ship that will last forever" Captain George Moodie-First Master of the Cutty Sark

Rescued by the Cutty Sark Preservation Society' in 1951, Cutty Sark is the last survivor of the China Tea Clippers, the most advanced and beautiful sailing ships ever built. No clipper was finer, faster or more famous than Cutty Sark during the heyday of British merchant shipping.

The Great Ship Race: Cutty Sark was designed and built in 1869 with the sole aim of winning the annual race of tea clippers from China to England. Each winter, in the most exciting and prestigious race of the time, these ships would set sail to the Orient, racing back with the first of the new season's tea. The highly competitive and extremely lucrative race became an obsession amongst seafarers and the public, with considerable sums of money being wagered on the outcome.

Beyond the Tea Trade: With the opening of the Suez Canal, tea clippers ceased to be a profitable form of transport and steamships took over. After 8 years as a tea clipper Cutty Sark was forced to seek alternative cargoes and began ferrying goods between east and west, including jute for New York, oil for Java, buffalo horns for London and scrap iron for Shanghai, sometimes covering distances of over 1,000 miles in just 3 days.

The Wool Trade: It wasn't until 1883 when she entered the Australian wool trade that Cutty Sark's true mettle really showed. Her first passage home from New South Wales to the channel took only 82 days, and she soon became famed around the world for her speed and resilience even in rough seas. For 10 years she was unbeaten on her passage home, occasionally even out-running her steam rivals.

Under the Portuguese flag: With the wool trade no longer profitable, Cutty Sark was sold to the Portuguese in 1895, and spent the next 27 years carrying cargoes between Portugal and its colonies. Eventually, having been dismasted in a severe gale, re-rigged as a

barquentine and in considerable disrepair, she was recognised and rescued by the retired Cornish mariner Capt. Wilfred Dowman. Rerigged and restored as a clipper Cutty Sark came back under the British flag and became a training ship. When no longer required in this role, Cutty Sark found her final resting place where she still proudly lies today, in Greenwich. She was opened to the public by HM the Queen in 1957.

On the 22nd November 1999 the 'Cutty Sark' was 130 years old!



On board the 'Cutty Sark' sales of O.D.C Bullnose (040G) has now been exhausted and the Model T will now be available to visitors instead (117TG).

'Truly a Lucky Strike'

As promised - the fourth vehicle in the series of old cigarette brands (119TG) edition of 2500 - is dedicated to the U.S. 'Lucky Strike' was introduced in 1917 and first appeared with U.S. servicemen on the shores of the U.K. around 1942/3. The packaging has scarcely changed in all that time and our photo shows an original pack. Facts: In 1917 the American Tobacco Company founded by James Buchanan Duke, launched 'Lucky Strike'.

The 'Lucky Strike' bulls eye motif originated from 'Lucky Strike' tobacco a

brand established in 1871. The pack is

basically as original except the grey background has been replaced with white.

Lledo

We as a company were sad to hear of the demise of Lledo. The Lledo company was founded some 15 years ago by ex Lesney and Matchbox personnel led by Jack Odell (hence ODELL in reverse). O.D.C. were fortunate in being able to purchase the Lledo machinery which included plastic moulding, die-cast and pad printing equipment. The removal from Lledo's London factory to the South Wales factory of O.D.C. was quite a



task and one totally masterminded by Taff, who took his own team of engineers to Lledo's London plant. It took 6 days of careful dismantling and five low loaders to transport it all to Wales.

However, O.D.C. felt to obtain the model moulds would pose many problems.

Firstly there were around 120 moulds in the Lledo range - O.D.C.'s own identity would be overshadowed, if not lost!
Secondly to release this amount of product would not be possible. For example just 1000 pieces of each model would

have led to 120,000 models going into the market. Our members could not have coped, and it would have only been possible by releasing the range through retail outlets. Something we have pledged not to do with our main range. Thirdly, our own schedule of



new model releases would have been totally overwhelmed and possibly shelved permanently. Our manufacturing capacity will now increase dramatically, possibly three fold, with the new machinery – and the quality in certain areas will definitely improve.

We must confess, the following



vehicles were scheduled for production by Lledo - and O.D.C. were asked to fill the empty void. These were; 'Castrol'(Germany), 'Fishermans Friend', 'Thorntons' and 'Firestone' (USA). We hope the companies and the customers involved are as delighted with the O.D.C. range.

New Model Launch

The new Millennium dawns and O.D.C. begins its 6th year in business, and what nicer way than a brand new model, the delightful Ford 'Model A'.

First manufactured in 1928 it was the immediate successor to the 'Model T'. As with most early automobiles all that was manufactured was the chassis, bonnets etc.

The body building was carried out by numerous body builders. In 1926 sales of the 'Model T' dropped dramatically. Price cuts were introduced but to no avail - the 'Model T' had not kept up with

the requirements of the American people. In other words - it had had its day! Ford's new concept was very simple - a vehicle that delivered speed, power and comfort, hence the 'Model A'. In contrast to the 'Model T', several body colours would also be made available. There were 5850 parts required for the new 'Model A' and in 1928 the first models rolled off the production lines. However, by 1931 production ceased after nearly 5 million 'Model A's' had been produced.

Our model is based on the 1929 Parcel Delivery Van. The first vehicle in the range is A001G carrying the O.D.C. logo with an edition of just 2500 pieces. It is interesting to note

although our club membership is higher, we sometimes produce lower editions - as this will of course, give our models greater collectability and ongoing value.



WALES RM

In 1936-37 buses bearing the South Wales fleet name replaced the Swansea trams. Throughout many decades South Wales Transport (SWT) withstood nationalisation, mergers and privatisation. This brought with it several additions as buses from other regions were integrated into its fleet, one such vehicle being the Routemaster. Our RM is shown here in Llunelly (the spelling being the anglicised version of Llanelli) and would have regularly been seen passing the local Town Hall

dropping off passengers.

Desert Force

The 7th Armoured Division



A legendary part of the 8th Army in North Africa were the famous 'Desert Rats' (the 7th Armoured Division).

Many films have been made about them and there were many heroes, some fiction and some for real – none more real however than David Stirling who penetrated enemy lines with his hand picked night patrol, causing untold damage!

The 7th Army returned home to England in early 1944 and resumed their duties joining up with the 21st Army Corp for the Normandy landings.

They were part of the representation British force to enter Berlin in 1945 at the end of the second world war.

This vehicle represents the colours and livery of the 7th - with an edition of 1500 pieces on Model No C033.

Note: This vehicle has the new open back.
