By the time of her assention to the throne, she had two children - Prince Charles 1948 and Princess Anne 1950,

Her father, King George VI was ill and had to undergo major surgery. The King appeared to be recovering well, so much so that Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip undertook a major tour of Canada and the USA, but packed into their luggage went a draft accession declaration with messages to both Houses of Parliament

They returned from their tour at the beginning of November 1951.

Three months later on January 31st 1952 Elizabeth and Philip waved goodbye to the King and Queen as they set off on another tour, this time to East Africa, Australia and New Zealand.

Just 6 days later, on the 6th February, they received the news of the Kings passing. They were resting in Kenya at the time and it was at the famous 'Tree Tops Lodge' that Elizabeth spent her last day as a Princess.

Sadly, the day that Elizabeth ascended the throne, Her Mother the Queen became the Queen mother.

It is 65 years ago that King George VI and Elizabeth (the Queen mother) celebrated their Coronation in 1937. The reign to last from the abdication of Edward VIII in 1936 to 1952, a total throne of 16 years and celebrating their Silver Wedding Anniversary in 1948.

The Queen mother, born in 1900 never expected to be Queen and only because of her brotherin-laws abdication was she thrust into the melet How history was rewritten by this event!



She bore two children, Elizabeth in 1926 and Margaret Rose in 1930. Widowed at the age of 52 she set about her role as Queen mother. Today, she is loved the world over as 'The Queens Mum' and our favourite grandmother.

King George VI, born in 1895 he was just 5 years older than his future bride.

One of 6 children with five brothers and one sister. Their father George V reigned from 1910-1936.

The heir apparent was of course Edward VIII, but he was to abdicate within months of his assent to the throne and before his Coronation

This left George second in line as his successor.

George (affectionately known as Bertie) could not have been less inclined or ready to

war clouds were hanging menacingly on the horizon. Nonetheless, he rose to the enormous challenge, fighting a stammer in his speech, he became a much loved monarch with caring portrayed in all his deeds. He steadfastly refused to move his family from Buckingham Palace during the Blitz, saying he wanted to be with his subjects.

The Kings reign ended after a prolonged illness at his Sandringham estate.

On 31st January he went to Sandringham where a few of his close friends awaited him for a shoot. He seemed quite well, even

> though it was only a few months since he underwent major surgery and he was still recuperating.

His valet took him a cup of tea early on the morning of Wednesday 6th Feb. 1952 to find that the King was dead.

The Herald carried the headlines 'Nation mourns Death of George VI'

Throughout it's life-span 'Valiant' was paired with other publications - 'Knock-out' in 1963 - 'Smash' in 1971 - 'T.V. 21' later in the same year - Lion (our old friend) in 1974 and 'Vulcan' in 1976.

The hero of 'Valiant' was 'Captain Hercules Hurricane' who appeared from the publications offset, leading his team of crack Royal Marine Commandos. His supreme colossal strength proved invaluable to his men.

Captain Hercules Hurricane and his pint size batman - wait for it - 'Maggot Malone' distinguished themselves in action throughout the second world war. The publication sold for 7d a copy.

Jean De Reszke was the brand and manufactured by J. Millhoff and Co Limited, Piccadilly W.1.

Jean De Reszke it seems was a well known singer as the brand in its strap-line refers to him as follows.

made for and always smoked by that great singer".

The brand consisted of 'De Reszke Majors' in grey packs (A) and in white packs (B), each of which carried a distinct picture of 'De Reszke' holding his song book. Whilst De Reszke filter tip (C) had a much smaller picture and no song book, there was also De Reszke 'Turks' (D) known as the aristocrats 'fag' (no picture of De Reszke). Being Turkish one presumes was probably too strong for or conducive to a good throat, or they'd killed him!


The National Botanical Garden of Wales


The National Botanic Garden is situated only twenty or so miles from the Black Mountain. The principle of informing and educating is central to the dynamic of the Garden's philosophy and facilities include teaching workshops for children, undergraduates and postgraduates and extra mural courses for others centred on a 'Bioverse' educational centre for biological sciences.

The garden has been developed in harmony with the 18th century layout of the surviving buildings and the park of the original Middleton Hall estate. The Hall and its 658 acre park were the creation and home of Sir Thomas Paxton, a formidable political figure who bought the estate in 1785 and commissioned Samuel Pepys Cockerell to design it.

The park itself may have been designed by William Emes, a major landscape architect of the late 18th century who specialised in themes involving water, which makes what remains ideal for aquatic plants around the lakes, ponds and streams within the woodlands.

Middleton Hall was burnt to the ground after an accidental fire in 1931 and the site and park were abandoned.
