The R.T. takes to the Road

Predecessor to the RM, the gorgeous R.T. makes its debut!

Manufactured by AEC, the RT (Regent) was first manufactured in the early 30's with 'London Transport'

being the main purchaser. By the mid to late 30's a bigger engine had been developed from the 7.7 litre to the 8.8 litre with the addition of an air pressure system that would operate the brakes and the gear change on the pre-selector gear box.

Versions of the R.T. went to many bus companies, including Leeds - Hull - Dundee - Cardiff and of course the largest fleet by far being 'London Transport'.

The post war Regent was called the MKII though it was basically the same as the previous model and the first bus of the new type went into service for 'Mansfield District Traction'.

Altogether, 596 MKII's went into service until the last one built in 1948

and operated by 'Reading Corporation'.

One of the larger operators of this bus was 'Liverpool Corporation' (100) 'South Wales' (41) -

have this one! -'Trent Motor Traction' (55),

'City of Oxford' (20) plus many smaller operators.

One order of interest was from 'Midland Red' for 100 vehicles which were supplied without canopies, they preferred a different body to the standard one.

IT'S A KNOCKOUT



50 years ago the wonderful musical 'Singing in the Rain' hit our screens.

MGM's technicolor musical treasure as it was called was released in 1952 and became one of the most celebrated film musicals of all time starring Gene Kelly, Donald O'Connor and Debbie Reynolds. It was set in 1927 and epitomised the creativity

of the studios from stage musicals to lavish screen production. The choreographer was the stars main actor Gene Kelly and its producers Arthur Freed, Vincente Minnelli and Stanley Donen.

Who can forget the title song 'Singing in the Rain' which sequence must have been shown hundreds of times, or the fabulous Donald O'Connor dancing up the wall! Not forgetting the spectacular music 'Broadway Melody' with guest star Cyd Charisse, and how gorgeous Debbie looked!

IN THE NAVY

Much requested and now delivered - the cigarettes of the 'Royal Navy' - 'RN'!

Now we know a lot about this brand due to many

members telling us so much about it, in particular, member J. Dawson of Portsmouth. Sailors fondly referred to them as 'Pursers Blue Liners' as they carried a blue line down each cigarette and were issued to seamen at shore bases or to Reserve ships not at sea. Each month every person received 3 cigarette coupons and each coupon

entitled you to 100 cigi's or a tin of tobacco to roll your own - or if you preferred - a tin of pipe tobacco. We guess your popularity soared if you didn't smoke as the coupons were extremely tradable.

A sailor was allowed 25 cigarettes a night whilst on shore and 200 to go on leave with. The sailors reckoned they were so cheap at just 3/- a hundred - (later 7 shillings a hundred), because, they

were the sweepings from the factory floor. In the 1960's you could obtain plain and tipped versions. After they increased the price further, they were often smuggled, and lord help you if you were caught.

The cigarettes were in fact manufactured by various manufacturers including 'Gallaghers' - 'BAT' - 'Sobranie' and were signified on the back of packs by their initial ie. 'G' for Gallaghers etc.

Of course in the early days health warnings were not printed on packs, but later packs of 'RN' carried them!

ALSO, member Mr. Barkworth recalls RN's with the blue line and his recollection is they were 'Full of salt peter' and costing 41/2d per pack around 1949-50 time.

On the Subject of CIGI'S

Member Mr. L. Barrow used to work for B.A.T. and has sent us a very interesting article on 'State Express'. Extracts are taken from the publication only, as the whole article would fill the Globe!

Chairman Mao smoked them, General Montgomery ordered them for the Dessert Rats and in 1941 thousands of packets were dropped over Holland bearing a message from their exiled Queen!

'State Express' started in 1893 and named after a train that recorded a speed of 1.12 m.p.h. The train was called 'The Empire State Express' and carried the insignia '999'. On the train was Sir Albert Levy founder of British Tobacco Co. When he returned to the UK he promptly registered a shortened version of the trains name, thus 'State Express' plus he registered a sequence of triple numbers!



GREEN ROVER

The name 'Green Rover' was adopted by a Watford operator and was used on a fleet of vehicles in that area.

Our model is based on a vehicle (as shown) in 1991. She was previously owned by BEA and one presumes had the closing side entrance doors. Oh' and maybe a towbar at the back!





The second vehicle in our new 'Military Series' 'HMS Belfast'.

Built in the mid 30's and launched in March 1938. She served as a flagship throughout the second World War, playing a leading part in the destruction of the German Battle Cruiser 'Scharnhorst' at the battle of North Cape and was one of the larger vessels taking part in the Normandy landings.

After the war 'Belfast' supported the U.N. forces in Korea and remained in service with the Royal Navy until 1965.

She carried an all male crew of 916 ratings and officers happily smoking 'RN' cigis we guess!

In 1971 she was saved from the scrap yard and moored on the Thames near 'Tower Bridge' to serve as a permanent museum and historic reminder of Britains naval heritage in the first half of the twentieth century.

An hour round this huge and complex warship will take you from the Quarter deck up to the bridge and all the way down through nine decks to her massive boiler and engine rooms. On your journey, you will see her triple 6 inch thick gun turrets and heavily armoured shell rooms. You can almost feel the tossing and turning on the high seas and feel the atmosphere, whilst experiencing what life was like for her crew, especially when you visit the cramped Mess decks, Officers cabins, Galley and Sick Bay.

The guns in both turrets are trained and elevated onto a target 12.5 miles away in North West London. In fact, targeted onto the Gateway Service Station on the M1, a reminder of the awesome power of naval gunnery in the War.

A NOTE OF CAUTION - Take your helmet if going into 'Gateway' for a cuppa?

Another interesting point is that the forward boiler room is guarded by a double set of doors forming an airlock into the compartment beyond. This was essential as any sudden change in air pressure could result in the boilers 'fleebing back' and
