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

TONY HANGOCK

I'm not sure which of the shows I enjoyed the best during Tony Hancocks TV and radio appearances as everyone has their favourite. However I fondly remember the episode The Lawyer: The Crown v James (2 December 1957 - TV).

Hancock played the barrister (not a good barrister) and the show starts with a lorry driver on trial for bigamy - eight times. Hancock delivers a fantastic speech which results in the lorry driver being sent to jail for six years. Unfortunately he was supposed to be defending him. So when Sid (Sid James) was accused of a smash

and grab raid and finds that he



has Hancock as his lawyer, he's not very pleased. Tony was born on the 12th May 1924 in Birmingham and in 1942 he volunteered for the RAF and after being rejected by ENSA, he was accepted by Ralph Reader who organised groups into Gang Shows. It was here he met Robert Moreton, Graham Stark and Peter Sellers. After several successful series on the Radio Tony turned to TV and for 5 years his shows ran concurrently on both. At one point complaints poured in from publicans and shopkeepers who protested that when Hancock was on TV the pubs were empty and the shops deserted. His first film although a success in the UK was not accepted in the USA. During this period his most successful scriptwriters- Ray Galton and Alan Simpson - came up with another series Steptoe & Son which was a huge success. Hancocks scripts were never the same and soon in depression he turned to alcohol. Sadly he committed suicide whilst in Australia at the age of 44. Since his tragic death his fame has not diminished, but instead his comic genius has grown in stature. ARMY & NAVY STORES


Founded in 1871, the Society of Army & Navy Stores was formed by a group of Army & Navy officers to provide basic necessities and luxuries of life to all members, namely British officers, serving soldiers and their families.

Financed with an initial capital outlay of fifteen thousand pounds of share capital, the society was based on the cooperative principle with



share dividends available to members. Following the depression of the 1920's with the reduction in trade, the membership base was broadened to permit the general public to become members free of charge. In 1934 the society's name was changed from Army & Navy Cooperative Society Ltd. to Army & Navy Stores. The company produced


a catalogue from which a broad range of products could be ordered and delivered cheaply. A reproduction of this catalogue found its way into Taff's hands and we produced this lovely Chevrolet Delivery Truck, Checking out the prices back in 1939 makes great reading. A typewriter for £10, soup spoons 30/- per dozen or if your looking for a lovely pair of patent shoes you could have purchased them for 24 shillings and 6d - those certainly were the days. For convenience the items in the catalogue were also available in the Indian depots - Bombay, Calcutta and New Delhi.






HOTSPUR

Over 100 copies of it were produced since it was introduced in September 1933. In 1957 it changed its name to the New Hotspur before it finally left circulation in 1981.






The Beacon is Lit - The story of 'Thunder Chief' - the Indian Chief who guarded the wagon trains of the West.

Just over a year ago we received a letter from Mr John Wells from Bristol (Membership No 164801) and enclosed were some copies of a magazine Practical Mechanics.

They belonged to his late father Mr Francis John Wells who had a subscription with the local newsagent. He was in the printing business, employed as a cutter and obviously

had an interest for all things mechanical. We don't know an awful lot about the publication except that it was issued monthly and that early editions were in black and white. The subjects covered were wide ranging, some

being very practical such as making a sink 69 unit whilst others were slightly more specialised - how to make a Geiger

Counter, All of the copies we received were priced at 1/3d and each carried the editors name F.J.CAMM

Over 7 million visitors make their way there every year - many head for Blackpool Pleasure Beach, which has over 140 rides, the famous Tower - with playground, ballroom, Jungle Jim's and Circus! There are 3 magnificent piers, with a 108-foot Big Wheel and the Skycoaster! Come within inches of creatures of the deep, at the Sea Life Centre! For a really wild day out, spend the day with the animals at the zoo. Blackpool is famous for its Illuminations, from the beginning of September to November over half a million light bulbs decorate the

promenade, which is dominated by the 518 foot Tower - a sight not to be missed! Our Routemaster has a lovely display of illuminations on the side you can just-imagine it running along the front.



H.M.S. EDINBURGH

There have been five previous warships to carry the name Edinburgh, the first in 1707 being a fifth rate warship carrying only 32 guns.

The second was the forty year old Warspite which in 1715 was rebuilt and renamed Edinburgh. She had a long and distinguished career culminating in the award of battle honours "USHANT 1747" and "CAPE FRANCOIS 1757'.

The third Edinburgh was a third rate of 70 guns, launched in 1811. She also had a busy career, distinguishing herself gaining the battle honours "SYRIA 1840"

against the Egyptians and 'BALTIC 1854/55'

in the war against the Russians. In 1882, a steel plated turret ship of 9,150 tons was launched to become the fourth Edinburgh.

> guns and was heavily armoured. The last, and most famous, warship to bear the name was the cruiser built in 1939. She played a major part in many actions gaining the honours 'NORWAY 1940/41", "ATLANTIC 1941", "MALTA CONVOYS 1941" and "ARCTIC 1941/42". On 30th April 1942 whilst on convoy duty to Murmansk she was torpedoed by the German U-Boat U456 and later sank, 57 men along with her cargo of £5 million in gold bullion,

en route to us as war payment, were lost. In 1981

She was the first battleship to carry breech loading

the ship was again in the news when the gold, then worth £45 million, was salvaged

> from her. The sixth and current HMS Edinburgh is a Batch III Type 42 destroyer built by Cammell Laird Shipbuilders at Birkenhead. Laid down in July 1980, she was launched by Mrs Anne Heseltine on 14 April 1983.Displacing some 4,800 tons and 140 metres long, Edinburgh is complemented for 26 Officers and 260 Ratings. She is powered by two Tyne gas turbines for cruising and two Olympus gas turbines which give a maximum speed in excess of 30 knots.

A comprehensive radar and sonar suite inputs into the ship's computer system to allow an effective use of her weapons; Sea Dart anti-air or anti-surface missile system, a single 4.5 inch

automatic gun, and 20mm guns for close range defence and policing roles. Also available is a multi-role Lynx helicopter capable of deploying missiles and torpedoes. Modern electronic warfare and communications equipment along with data links to exchange computer information with other ships makes Edinburgh, along with her Batch III sisters York,

Gloucester and Manchester one of the most capable surface ships in the Royal Navy today. Thanks to Roderick Morris who suggested this and we dedicate this model to all those who lost their lives during the sinking of the fifth warship 60 years ago.


