The tips add that if you have no sugar then you should substitute with dates and raisins - the banana trifle looks very good.




A word from

The primary aim of The Samaritans is to be available 24 hours a day to provide confidential and emotional support for people who are experiencing feelings of distress or despair.

There are 203 Samaritan branches in the UK, Republic of Ireland and the Channel Islands whose volunteers are available 24 hrs. per day on the Samaritan national local rate number 08457 90 90 90, as displayed on the model. Many of the branches are also open to personal callers every day and several provide, an increasingly popular e-mail service, with email contacts coming from all over the world.

November 2nd 2003 saw the 50th Anniversary of its founding by the Rev. Chad Varah, and branches will be celebrating throughout the coming year with many fundraising events.

The Oxford Diecast Commemorative RT Bus was developed from an idea of a volunteer in the Kingston upon Thames Branch.



This is the first in a new series of vehicles covering football clubs from around the country. The first releases include teams from the Football League and it is hoped that we will add others from Scotland in the future. All of the models will come in a clear box and special packaging. The first release carries the logo of Oxford United, a team that has recently moved to the new Kassam Stadium. Times have changed

from 1893 when it was an amateur club called Headington United, a village team known locally as 'the boys from up the hill'. It was in 1960 that the name changed to Oxford United in order to increase appeal to the whole city. A couple of years later Accrington Stanley folded and United were elected to the Fourth Division, It's heyday came in the 1980's when it reached the First Division. Today the club play in Division 3.

Due to the licensing and packaging costs these models will be sold at £5.95 each. They can still be purchased in 4 for 3 and 6 for 4 lots. To do this simply add the extra £1 on the order form enclosed, e.g. If you buy 6 for 4 which normally cost £19.80

The Welsh Guards was raised on 26 February 1915 by order

of His Majesty King
George V, in order to
include Wales in the
national complement of
regiments of Foot Guards
identified with the
countries of the United
Kingdom. Two days later,
the Battalion mounted its
first King's Guard at
Buckingham Palace on 1
March 1915 - St. David's

Day. In the same year it was awarded its first Victoria Cross - Sergeant



Robert Bye at Pilckem in July 1917. The 1st Battalion sailed for France on 17 March 1915 and fought in Loos on 27 September 1915. The 2nd Battalion was formed in 1939 and fought in Boulogne in 1940. In May 1940, at the Battle of Arras, the Regiment's second Victoria Cross was won by Lieutenant Hon Christopher Furness who was killed in action. In 1941, a 3rd Battalion was raised and fought throughout the Tunisian and Italian Campaigns.

The 1st and 2nd Battalion formed part of the Guards Armoured Division - working together they were the first troops to re-enter Brussels in September 1944.

Shortly after the war the 3rd Battalion was disbanded and the 2nd Battalion based in suspended animation. Since 1945 the 1st Battalion has served around the world and in 1982 formed part of the Task Force in the Falklands Campaign. GR007 is the seventh in our Guards & Regiments release.

It was in the 1950's that magazines like these released all sorts of information and ideas. Sir Clive Sinclair published an article on 'The Micro-Midget Pocket Portable' back in 1958. Who can forget the reel to reel decks that some of us used. For many the Ferrograph recorder was the dream machine based in a robust metal case. Later their equipment was described by reviewers as being 'Built like a Battleship'. Now that's what I call a tape recorder!
