An early charabanc with a fixed roof, *Swiftsure* was a very large vehicle built in the early 1900's by the Lancashire Steam Motor Company, before being renamed Leyland Motors Ltd, it is based on the X type chassis. They went on to make thousands of motor coaches and buses in the decades to come. Charabanc (*char á banc*) translated means "wagon

with benches" and in the early days they would often be tiered to give every passenger a good view forward. This model has been released into Europe and the shape is well known to bus enthusiasts as the silhouette is used as the basis of the logo for Busworld a biannual event that takes place in Kortrijk Belgium and attracts visitors from around the world. This item will

release once more in 2008, but in a different livery. It's quite a big model at 4.5 inches long, but does come

packaged on a plinth in a case. There is no certificate with this model, but only 504 will be



We are asked frequently to produce plain vehicles without liveries, but without a doubt it is the Morris Minor that is requested the most. So here are two releases to satisfy the demand, one black and one white. They are uncertificated as we anticipate making more over the coming years to meet the needs of the model makers who enjoy decorating their own vehicles.

The other bodyshells in our CA series feature the one-piece windscreen, but you'll note from the picture that our ice-cream variant has the window split. This was a feature of the MK1 version, but there were many complaints and Vauxhall's windscreen suppliers were asked to make a curved version using the same technology as for the Victors and Crestas. It is generally thought that the MK11 front, which was launched in 1959, on which our vehicles are based wouldn't therefore have a split windscreen.

This isn't true as many of the coachbuilders who made modified versions often purchased the chassis and added their own body parts, often these kits would come from other suppliers. Hence MK11 fronts could often be seen with what looked like MK1 body

features. It wasn't until later that CALZ one-piece window sets were supplied.

The generator was mounted on a strengthened 'chassis tail' as the normal tail would be to weak to hold it. It sat under the counter at the back, being vented by a small mesh grille seen below the waistband. An all-glassfibre roof reduced the weight of the body, but the overall load was still very heavy.

The CA was a very important vehicle to the ice-cream market and there were many different variants produced by the different manufacturers. Some articles report 50 per month being produced, which when you think of the other vehicles available, means 1,000's of vans coming off the production line each year. The picture shows a pre-production variant, the finalised product has a cream interior.

In May 1952, BOAC became the first airline to introduce a passenger jet, the de Havilland Comet. All Comet 1 aircraft were grounded in April 1954 after four Comets crashed, the last two being BOAC aircraft. Investigators discovered serious structural cracks caused by metal fatigue due to the repeated pressurisation and

depressurisation of the aircraft as they ascended and descended. While rectifying this problem, de Havilland engineers improved the Comet in many ways and improved its range, creating the Series 4. In 1958, BOAC used the new Comets to become the first airline to fly jet passenger services across the Atlantic. During the 1950s and 1960s, BOAC shifted to a largely Boeing-made fleet, starting with a 1956 order

largely Boeing-made fleet, starting with a 1956 order for 15 Boeing 707s. Sir Giles Guthrie, who took charge of BOAC in 1964, preferred the Boeing aircraft for economic reasons, and indeed BOAC began turning a profit in the late 1960s. The preference for US-

made aircraft caused a political row in Parliament, however, and the government ordered BOAC to purchase 17 Vickers VC-10 aircraft from a 30-aircraft order which Guthrie had cancelled. However the VC-10 had somewhat higher operating costs than the 707, largely as a result of BOAC's own demands for the aircraft to have excellent "hot and high" performance.BOAC later became the largest Boeing customer outside North America. The next major order of Boeing aircraft was for 11 747-100s. BOAC received its first 747 on April 22, 1970 but due to strike action by the British Air Line Pilots Association the aircraft did not enter commercial service for almost a year, on April 14, 1971.

On September 1, 1972, the British Airways Board was formed, a holding board that controlled BOAC and BEA. On March 31, 1974, both the BOAC and BEA were dissolved and their operations merged to form British Airways.

The first releases of 1:76 cars has been widely praised as fulfilling a missing need for collectors and railway modellers alike. Over the coming months we will release other liveries covering police and taxi themes.

New tooling is also in development with the FX4 taxi arriving in November and the Cortina MK1/2 and Morris Minor Travellers at the backend of the year. The Landrovers will also release as 88/109 inch wheelbase variants, as will the new FX4 taxi. All of these models are competitively priced at just £2.95 each and come on a plinth in a case. Although they are not certificated, we are batching them through the factory and once the colour is gone, we are unlikely to reproduce the same colour scheme. TAFF

I have met up with many members and diecast enthusiasts over the years at events up and down the country. I get a lot of information out of these and the feedback helps us to decide our liveries and product planning. At the Dorset Steam Fair in 2006 I met Ken Keast from Cornwall who was an extelecom engineer. We got talking about the J2 and I advised him confidentially that we would be releasing a version in the new year. He made me aware of the stepped roof version which is shown here, although we struggled to get a good selection of old photos.

The Post Office only ever used Morris badged vehicles and the stepped roof version came from a time when the GPO was prepared to invest and modify vehicles to meet its specialist requirements. The need for standing room meant that the roof had to be raised, so a translucent fibre glass panel was created to give an extra 3/4 inches, these however soon weathered. For security reasons the side panels were not pressed out and the side doors were shortened to allow extra storage room internally. The rear door was two part (fibreglass), to allow easier opening

and closing and the ladder rack was placed centrally across the roof; this made it difficult to remove.

Morris J2 - Stepped Roof GPO 2000 £9.95 JM005 1:43

While the adaptation of the J2 van produced a much cheaper vehicle than the previous larger coach-built 25cwt vehicles, it was still nevertheless, expensive in comparison with other conversions of commercial vans for engineering purposes. By utilising double side door variants, which later became a standard BMC optional extra, it was felt that the easy access to the front end eliminated the need to clamber into the body - hence the fibre glass roof was removed, the rear doors reverted to a one piece and the ladder rack could be mounted on the side of the roof.

This is the second Post Office version, the JM001 is sold out, which was based on the Stores-Carrying vehicle. No doubt at some time in the future we will release the third variant with the side mounted ladder rack. A big thank you to Ken for supplying the information which has allowed us to produce this variant - the JM005.TAFF



This model is coded OT024 and comes cased and has been used for a promotion in Germany, releasing later this year. There are 4,500 that have been produced, but we will release just 288 into the UK - available on a first come first serve



Some updated information regarding our future release programme. The CA van and minibus have been sampled and are scheduled for release over the coming months. The Pantechnicon version of the CA is proving a little bit of a problem, as the height of it means it doesn't fit either our low top or high top casing - it's a fraction too big, I'm not sure what to do, but I will keep everyone updated. The HA is also shown here in pre-production format. The printing on the Post Office version was incorrect 'TEEPHONES" not "TELEPHONES", I actually missed it, but Ritas eagle eye caught it.







Pre production shots of the Bedford CA, which make nice editions to the Milkfloat and Ice Cream variants that have just released. Still to complete are the trials of the Pantechnicon version.

The HA's will come in five different bodyshapes, including a high top, ice cream, Beagle and camper version. Look closely at the Post Office Telephone version and you'll see the printing error on the pre-production sample.







The new TX4 will arrive in the early part of 2008, with test shots taking place in November. Initially this will appear as a 1:43rd scale model and later as a 1:76 scale model. Test shots will take place in November/December. This is a very detailed model with a lot of curves on the bosyshape, the grille is a separate component and is a very distinctive feature of the model. The wheels on the sample are just for support, the actual hub and tyre will be correct.
